### Mission

The High Museum of Art collects, interprets, and preserves works of art, serving as the primary visual arts resource for the diverse communities of the greater metropolitan area of Atlanta. The Museum strives to engage and educate its regional, national, and international audiences, while promoting scholarship through research and publication.

### Organization History

The High Museum of Art is the leading art museum in the southeastern United States. Located in midtown Atlanta's arts and business district, the High has more than 14,000 works of art in its permanent collection. The Museum has an extensive anthology of 19th- and 20th-century American art; significant holdings of European paintings and decorative art; a growing collection of African American art; and burgeoning collections of modern and contemporary art, photography, and African art. The High is also dedicated to supporting and collecting works by Southern artists.

The High Museum has an annual attendance of over 400,000 visitors. In 2015 more than 56,000 PreK–12th grade students visited the High.

### Museum Education Goal

The goal of educational programs at the High is to engage a growing and diverse community with the Museum through personally meaningful learning experiences that are distinguished by originality and excellence.

### Purpose of a field trip to the High Museum of Art

Bringing a school group on a trip to the High complements and enhances the curriculum by making learning come alive. All docent-guided tours are inquiry-based and encourage students to use higher order thinking skills to discuss works of art. Hands-on workshops, taught by professional teaching artists, provide students with the opportunity to make art that is inspired by what they see and discuss in the galleries.
