Use the artwork *Brown Dog on the Road, Vinings, GA* by Nellie Mae Rowe to investigate the elements of narrative, including character, setting, and plot.

A CLOSER LOOK AND SUGGESTED DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

Nellie Mae Rowe (American, 1900–1982) grew up working very hard with her family on their farm and sometimes on neighboring farms as well. When Nellie Mae became an adult and no longer had to do the hard work of picking cotton and planting crops, she thought back and remembered fun and carefree times when she could play as a child. Her adult home on Paces Ferry Road in Vinings, Georgia, became "Nellie's Playhouse." Rowe decorated her house with objects that she found, including handmade dolls, chewing-gum sculptures, and hundreds of drawings, which she displayed in books, lined up on ledges and hung side by side on walls. Thanks to a major gift from her neighbor and friend Judith Alexander, the High offers the largest public collection of Rowe's artwork. Take one minute to look closely at this artwork by Nellie Mae Rowe.

- What's going on in this picture? What do you see that makes you say that?
- If you were going to give this picture a title, what would it be? Why?
- How many characters can you find? Describe each of them. Use adjectives to describe what they look like and what their personalities might be like.
- Imagine that two of the characters are having a conversation. What might they be saying?
- What is the setting of this picture? Imagine if you jumped inside. What would it sound like? Feel like? Smell like? Taste like? Can you turn these answers into sentences using lots of adjectives?
- Pretend this picture takes place in the middle of the story. What happened right before? What might happen next?

• Nellie Mae Rowe loved to use animals as subjects, or characters, in her artwork. Do you have a favorite animal? It can be real or imaginary. Think of your favorite animal as the main character in your story. Now think of one of your favorite places to go, and make it the setting of your story. What will happen? Write and draw a picture to go with your story!
